The Class History

Bewildered, yet quite anxious, were the ex-freshmen as the doors of Bassick opened to us on September 6, 1948. The seniors were helpful in many ways: we followed their advice and walked in circles until we became accustomed to the school routine, soon taking part in various activities.

As the year went on, we began organizing as the Class of "51". We elected our delegates and junior officers who set out to plan the social calendar for the coming year. At our first class meeting on June 14, 1949, Miss Helen Reed, our class adviser, informed the class of the plans. Our officers: president, Peter Seymour; vice-president, Joyce Bond; secretary, Joan Monturi; treasurer, David Pirozzoli; and directors of social activities, Shirley Miller and Bruce Barnes, were introduced to us.

The election of junior delegates early in September of 1949 started the wheels rolling. We began to assemble plans for the social events of the year.

On September 30, 1949, our first junior assembly was ably handled by Peter Seymour. The choice of blue and white as our class colors was announced, and the schedule of the coming events was given by Shirley Miller and Bruce Barnes.

November 17, 1949, is a day we will always claim outstanding in our memory, for on this day we filed to the gym to be measured for our rings. We anxiously awaited the day when the revered pieces of jewelry would arrive.

That popular friendship song can be easily applied to describe the lasting friendship between Bassick and Roger Ludlowe High Schools shown at the annual Bassick-Fairfield Football Hop at Grasmere auditorium on November 18, 1949. The usual "good time was had by all".

Valentine decorations brightened the library for the second big social event of the Class of "51", the Junior Mothers' Tea, on February 15, 1950. Although unpleasant weather prevailed throughout the day, over one hundred people attended and had an enjoyable get-together.

Our junior dance, better known as the Shamrock Shuffle, which was held on March 10, 1950, at the Ritz, turned out to be one of the most successful highlights of the year.

During the week of April 21-27, as juniors, eagerly anticipating a successful and enjoyable senior year, we elected our senior officers—president, David Pirozzoli; vicepresident, Joan Monturi; secretary, Gladys Busser; treasurer, Danny Rowell; and social directors, Shirley Miller and Peter Seymour, who was later replaced by Chester Zaniefski.

April 27, 1950, was a happy day for all juniors. At last our class rings had arrived! We displayed them proudly and found it hard to believe that we were almost fullfledged seniors.

Our junior year practically came to an end on May 24, 1950, whn Peter Seymour called our final class meeting to order. Reports from our officers showed that we had a very successful year.

Spotlight, cameras, action! We were now the stars of the show. We had finally earned recognition and were setting the example for our successors.

Being a serious-minded group, we buckled down to business on September 11, 1950, by electing our senior delegates. Our first senior class meeting was held on October 2, to discuss plans for the big coming event, our trip to West Point.

October 7, 1950—The day had come, and with all thoughts of homework and school routine far from our minds, we set out for West Point, viewing the scenic beauty and fully enjoying the triumph of Army over Penn State in a hotly contested football game.

On November 17, the students of Bassick and Fairfield High Schools met for their annual football hop which took place at the Ritz Ballroom. It was a great success.

As the house lights dimmed on December 1, 1950, the senior play, "Mother Is a Freshman", was presented by an outstanding cast. It proved a tremendous hit, and was enjoyed by all who attended.

Seniors were measured for their caps and gowns on January 11, 1950. How important we felt!

On March 15, 1951, the senior girls played hostesses at the Senior Mothers' Tea in the school library.

Senior girls took part again in the competition of sports and songs at the All Girls' Day program on April 4, 1951.

Soft music, happy faces, and spring: could anything be more exciting to a senior than his own prom at the Ritz Ballroom on May 18, 1951?

On June 5, television had to compete with the wonderful show the seniors presented at our Class Day exercises. We shall always remember the reading of the will, prophecy, characteristics, the class history, and the presentation of class mementos.

How beautiful was the coronation!

Our hearts were filled with deep appreciation and gratitude toward our adviser, Miss Reed. We pledged to attend the class reunion, and the distribution of yearbooks ended the program.

Practicing for graduation on June 12, 13, and 14, 1951, was a real thrill, leaving us anxious for the coming event.

The day had come at last. Graduation was here. Walking down the aisles of the Klein Memorial, we thought over the happy and successful days we had spent at Bassick; fond recollections of friends, teachers, and experiences, which will mean much to us in the future.

Surely that night we shall always remember, for it was the end but yet the beginning of a new venture in our lives, the venture which proves us worthy of those coveted diplomas. It will not be "Farewell to Bassick" for these years will always be a part of us no matter where our paths of life may lead.



Junior Mothers' Tea




"WATCH THE WORLD"






Cheering Squad






Baton Twirlers

Because this is the first year that Bassick has had a squad of baton twirlers, we are very proud of the progress and achievements the girls have made.





















