Creator: Captain Frederick Doten Title: Papers of Captain Frederick Doten Dates: June 1863-April 1865 Quantity: ½ manuscript box Abstract: Serving as an officer for Company F, 14th Connecticut, Captain Frederick Doten experienced fighting at Antietam and Gettysburg, and spent time in Libby Prison. His letters to his girlfriend, Georgia, offer an intimate view into both daily life of a Civil War officer and the horrors of the war. In several cases, letters were sent every other day. Biographical History

Captain Frederick Bartlett Doten was born on December 9, 1841 in Sheffield, Massachusetts. The eldest son of Bartlett and Augusta, Frederick was educated in both the town where he was born, and in Bridgeport, Connecticut.

It is unclear when Frederick elected to move to New York City for work, but it is known that he had been a clerk at a carriage manufacturing company in the city until the American Civil War began. He enlisted with the 14th regiment of Connecticut on April 1, 1862, first being placed in Company A. He was promoted to 2nd lieutenant, being moved to Company F upon that promotion. He soon thereafter was promoted to 1st lieutenant, then Captain which saw him return to Company A.

Frederick was present for many key battles of the war, including Antietam and Gettysburg. He was captured at Morton's Ford and sent to Libby Prison in February of 1864, only to be a part of a prisoner exchange in March of 1864.

With the conclusion of the war, Doten was mustered out in May 1865, returning first to Bridgeport and then to New York City to work in carriage manufacturing again. He married Georgiana L. Wells, whom he had written to extensively in the war, on October 4, 1866.

The couple moved back to Massachusetts in 1871, and lived a quiet life. Members of the local Unitarian church, Frederick was a part of the choir. It is unclear if the two had any children.

Frederick Doten died on April 9, 1903. He is buried in Unitarian Cemetery, Marblehead, MA

Scope and Content Note

The letters cover a period of 1863 to 1865, with a bulk focusing on October 1864-April 1865. All written to his then girlfriend, later wife Georgiana Wells, the letters discuss both the daily responsibilities of an officer during the American Civil War, and the horrors of what Doten witnessed as the war neared its end.
