# **Descriptive Summary**

**Abstract**: Bernard Riley, best known as Bud, was a Bridgeport native born in 1911. A mostly self-taught artist, he gained renown in the mid-20<sup>th</sup> century for his work. This collection documents the creation and initial promotion of his piece *Bridgeport's Great Historical Mural* which is a part of the second floor reference room in the Burroughs-Saden building at 925 Broad Street, Bridgeport,

## **Biographical History:**

Bernard Riley, best known as Bud, was a Bridgeport native born in 1911. A mostly self-taught artist, he worked factory jobs in Bridgeport to ensure a steady income for his wife Marie Radner and son, John. Riley's early career centered on helping with set dressing at Central High School, and soon he was making cartoons for the local paper, painting signs, and refining his art. He exhibited at the Pennsylvania Academy of Fine Arts in 1946, the first of many gallery showings which would go on to include the Silvermine Guild of Artists, and the Metropolitan Museum of Art.

He founded Third Stream Artists, the Silvermine Guild of Artists, and the Bridgeport Arts Council among other organizations.

Riley began planning the mural in the Bridgeport Public Library's Burroughs-Saden building in 1975, with execution starting in 1976. It was not completed in 1984, and he died soon after. During that time, Riley performed extensive research on Bridgeport's history. A display case on the second floor of the Burroughs-Saden building walks visitors through each element of the work.

## **Scope and Content note:**

This collection documents the creation and the initial promotion of *Bridgeport's Great Historical Mural* which is still visible in the second floor reference room of the Burroughs-Saden building of the Bridgeport Public Library. In addition to containing the original grant information that funded the creation of the mural, the collection contains in-progress photographs, information about the opening reception for the work, and promotion of the piece in the first decade of its existence – especially after Riley's passing.

#### **Arrangement Note:**

Series I, mural creation, contains images of the mural both completed and in progress, the original grant, reception planning, and documentation about the public reaction to its unveiling. Series II, Mural and Riley's legacy, documents the efforts to celebrate Bud Riley's legacy after his passing through promoting the mural, awarding artists, and celebrating the work for the accomplishment it is.
