Abstract: William W. Naramore was, among other things, a genealogy enthusiast, avid outdoorsman, and gun collector. William actively and avidly traced these various lineages in his research, which are all present in the collection that follows. His work allowed him to trace the family back as far as early colonist John Alden, and connect the various families of the area back into the 1600s and 1700s.

Biographical History:

William W. Naramore (1876-December 15, 1959) was, among other things, a genealogy enthusiast, avid outdoorsman, and gun collector. He worked as an electrical engineer at United Illumining, and served as the president for his family's business - first known as the Bridgeport Coach Lace Company, and later the Bridgeport Fabric Company.

Founded in 1837, the Bridgeport Coach Lace company in 1837 created upholstery for carriages in the 19th century, and remained in business by providing upholstery for the automobile industry.

The incredible wealth of the company (which in the mid-20th Century became the Bridgeport Fabric Company) meant that the Naramores were well to do and held political power within the city. They also interacted with and married into other major families within the greater Bridgeport area, including the Beers and the Wheelers.

William actively and avidly traced these various lineages in his research, which are all present in the collection that follows. His work allowed him to trace the family back as far as early colonist John Alden, and connect the various families of the area back into the 1600s and 1700s.

Naramore himself died in Sarasota, Florida, having only very recently retired to that area. He and his wife Marion are buried at Mountain Grover Cemetery in Bridgeport.

Scope and Content note:

The research in each folder generally represents correspondence, pedigree charts, and written notes in order to trace the lineages of various Fairfield County families in the greater Bridgeport

area. The extent can vary greatly between families, but offers an excellent starting point for those looking to explore these roots.
