Abstract: Cesar Batalla was one of Bridgeport's most well-known and well-regarded activists. Born in Aguas Buenas, Puerto Rico on June 14, 1945, the Batalla family moved when Cesar was eight. He began his career in activism in 1970 as a NAACP delegate, and would go on to become a key part of Bridgeport's Hispanic and Latinx communities in their work for social change and social justice. This collection was created by Cesar Batalla and reflects coverage of both his career and the causes he sharming and transportation.

Biographical History:

Cesar Batalla was one of Bridgeport's most well-known and well-regarded activists. Born in Aguas Buenas, Puerto Rico on June 14, 1945, the Batalla family moved when Cesar was eight. As a child he attended one of the city's parochial schools, and then Bassick High School. But he did not complete his time at the University of Bridgeport due to being drafted to fight in the Vietnam War.

A full biography of Cesar Batalla written by Professor Sonya Huber as a part of the Bridgeport History Center's *Grassroots Historians* series is <u>available online</u>, and delves into his childhood in Bridgeport and offers extensive details of his activism career, which began in 1970 as a delegate of the NAACP. Readers are strongly advised to refer to her work.

Batalla became engaged with Hispanic and Latinx affairs in the city of Bridgeport after witnessing a renter's strike protest lead by the Young Lords Party - info - in 1971. By 1972, Batalla began working in the City of Bridgeport's Department of Humane Affairs, and then later, on a study of the city's health services. This would be only a portion of his career. He helped to organize free transportation for senior citizens (see the FISH file in the collection), worked with the Spanish American Coalition to provide services including drug treatment and Puerto Rican Festivals. He also worked with Action for Bridgeport Community Development (ABCD) along with Charles Tisdale.

His interests would go on to expand to affirmative action, block grants, education, housing, and block grants. This was also all done while he worked at the Southern Connecticut Gas Company located on State and Broad streets in Bridgeport and raising two daughters.

Cesar Batalla was diagnosed with leukemia in 1993, dying of it on July 30, 1996. In addition to having a school and a street named after him in Bridgeport, a great number of colleagues, reporters, and residents of Bridgeport still recall him and his brand of activism with both deep fondness and respect.
