Abstract: Herman Steinkraus is best known in Bridgeport for being the long-time president of the Bridgeport Brass Company and one of the founding members of the Barnum Festival. The collection contains the speeches he gave as the president of the Chamber of Commerce of the United States, photographs of his professional activities and interests, and information about the

construction of I-95 in Connecticut.

Biographical History:

Herman Steinkraus is best known in Bridgeport for being the long-time president of the Bridgeport Brass Company and one of the founding members of the Barnum Festival. He was born on 16 Dec 1890, in Cleveland, Ohio. He attended Western Reserve University in that same city, gaining degrees in both economic and political science.

His career, which began in sales with the Osborn Manufacturing Company in Cleveland, paused when Steinkraus enlisted in World War I. He served in the 127th infantry, 32nd division, commanding company K and won the Distinguished Service Cross during his service, leaving with the rank of Colonel. He was proud of his service, and would go on to be a part of the Legion of Valor - a veteran's organization for winners of the Distinguished Service Cross, Congressional Medal of Honor, and the Navy Cross.

Steinkraus came to the attention of the Bridgeport Brass Company in 1928, which bought out Steinkraus' company in Cleveland, which was selling metal and chemical products, in order to bring him into the company. As a part of that deal, he became the vice president of sales, eventually reaching the rank of president in 1941.

[Information about labor and management here] Under Steinkraus' time as president and especially thanks to the Second World War, Bridgeport Brass went from becoming a regional brass company to a national one, opening additional plants in Michigan and Indianapolis. He remained on as president until 1957, and as chairman of the board until he fully retired in 1961.

His wife, Gladys Tibetts, began dating him not long after World War I concluded. The couple had three children - William (a noted equestrian), Ruth Constance (a concert pianist) and Marjorie Anne (who would go on to marry Count Guy de Roquemaurel of France).

In addition to his work at Bridgeport Brass, Steinkraus was active and involved in professional organizations and philanthropic ones. He was a member of the Chamber of Commerce of the United States, serving as president of that organization from <code>[years]</code> and engaged in extensive travel and lobbying. He served as a part of the International Rescue Committee, various boards, and the American Association for the United Nations where he served two presidential terms. The AAUN was particularly important in the early years of the United Nations itself, as it allowed for individual groups of people under the auspices of the UN to meet and determine how to help the UN achieve its goals and foster greater cooperation.

In Bridgeport, one of Steinkraus's greatest contributions was helping to found the Barnum Festival in 1949. Steinkraus was one of several citizens who proposed the idea of a festival to celebrate the city of Bridgeport's most well-known citizen, P.T. Barnum. He served on the board, and as ring master (the master of ceremonies for the festival) in 1950.

In retirement, Steinkraus remained active on behalf of organizations like the AAUN. He died at age 83 in Fairfield, Connecticut, on the 9th of May 1974.

Scope and Content note:

The papers of Herman Steinkraus are noteworthy for containing an extensive amount of Steinkraus's speeches from the 1940s and 1950s on the economic and labor conditions following World War II. As President of the Chamber of Commerce of the United States and as President of Bridgeport Brass, Steinkraus parlayed his managerial experience and understanding of labor unions into endless talks about America's post war economy and where the country was heading.

However, those seeking extensive information about his time at the Bridgeport Brass Company will be disappointed, as there is little business material present. Likewise, many of the subject files that relate to his various organizational involvements, such as the American Association for the United Nations and the Barnum Festival, are not extensive. The subject files are closer to snapshots of his interests and activities on a given topic. However, the photographs contain excellent documentation of Steinkraus's life, and the Thruway series provides insight into the construction of I-95 in Connecticut and represents a lesser known example of his interests.

Arrangement Note:

The material has been arranged into nine series. There is no apparent original order, save for how they were parsed out when processing began and the alphabetical nature of the subject files.

Series I contains the subject files curated by Steinkraus. Traditionally, subject files would not be placed first in a collection. However, owing to the little amount of personal material relating to Bridgeport Brass and the extensive amount of speeches in the collection, it was determined that subject files were to be placed first in order to demonstrate the scale of Steinkraus' interests. Subject files represent his interests. Material that does relate to Bridgeport Brass but was filed under this grouping has remained as such.

Series II features a small amount of material related to the Bridgeport Brass Company, which Steinkraus worked for years. It has been divided into multiple subseries. The first, News, features the company's newsletter as well as the letters that Steinkraus wrote to employees while president. Subseries 2, Servicemen correspondence, features letters from employees of Bridgeport Brass serving in the Second World War to Steinkraus and the company, sharing their experiences in the

fight and responding to company news and correspondence which was sent to them. A short subject file follows. Subseries 4 features Steinkraus's personal calendars for various years, primarily focused on meetings and appointments related to Bridgeport Brass. Subseries 5 contains photographs and curated photo albums, arranged by topic.

Series III, Speeches, has been divided into six subseries and contains some repetition. This is due to the arrangement of the speeches themselves, as Steinkraus appears to have used multiple organization systems. The first subseries features speeches that were originally held in binders, arranged chronologically, and labeled volumes 1-8. Subseries 2 features speeches that were organized with an accompanying index. Subseries 3, Speeches given under auspices of Chamber of Commerce of the United States, lists speeches at an item level and chronologically. These are all speeches Steinkraus gave while serving as the president of the Chamber of Commerce of the United States, and focus on labor relations and the economy. Subseries 4 contains publications that printed Steinkraus's speeches, and subseries 5 features other publications that he wrote for. Subseries 6 contains speech drafts, most untitled and undated.

Series IV, Thruway, represents research, documentation, publicity, support, and opposition to the construction of Interstate 95 in Connecticut, including Bridgeport. The construction of the area was meant to ease traffic congestion on US-1, also known as the Boston Post Road, which was now becoming over used. It had strong proponents and opposition, and there was pushback in Fairfield County in particular. Material has been organized with structure of organizations related to the construction first, then research, followed by reports and then publicity, both positive and negative.

Series V, Legion of Valor reflects an original order in the boxes material was placed in, and features primarily correspondence related to Steinkraus' time in executive positions within the Legion of Valor.

Series VI, Publications contains magazines with features about Steinkraus placed first, then newspaper clippings, and then samples of magazines that Steinkraus himself read.

Series VII, Photographs are arranged alphabetically by topic and feature a number of Steinkraus's interests. Also contains curated photograph albums with specific topics.

Series VIII, Scrapbooks contain scrapbooks, most without a specific topic. They feature various clippings on Steinkraus and his activities both related to Bridgeport Brass and not. Scrapbooks are bundled together by size.

Series IX, Audio/visual material features 3 reel tape recordings and 2 films that cannot be identified or played back at this time. They have no known dates.
