Much of June involved preparing for Summer Reading and Programming for those bustin' out of school! Paula facilitated many meetings and calls across the system to get all our ducks in a row—distribute incentives, clarify what incentives are for each degree of reading, and, with Anna K and Nykia, assemble gift baskets for each location's adult winner. Programs were confirmed, flyers made, website calendars and social media updated, and more. Kristin's google docs for keeping track of the readers went up on all computers. Decorations from branch to branch for our FIND YOUR VOICE theme vary from location to location! Library Page Robert Knuckles resigned June 23.

As the fiscal year comes to an end, we had an uptick in Condo Boards using our building for their annual meetings. We held two Juneteenth programs, collaborated with the Connecticut Beardsley Zoo on their bear scavenger hunt, and had a "School's Out" day with a puppet show called the Bugaboo Revue. End of the year class visits from St. Andrews were fun and good publicity for our summer program.

Our regular programs continued: Yoga, Mindfulness, Little Bears, LITT Chess, and Lawyers in Libraries. T-shirt adaptations and Losing Weight-Mind over Metabolism were well received. Griffin Health provided vaccine clinics and health check. Digital navigator and notary public are still popular.

Don Wilson from Bridgeport Youth Sports has a new e-sports program Monday through Friday through the summer. He brought some state of the art computers for the participants to use. We received more funding from LITT: Library Initiative for Teens and Tweens to continue our chess programs with DIG USA.

A last-minute meeting from one of our city council members included discussion of zoning issues and a talk by and with Police Chief Roderick Porter about community concerns. Displays: Celebrate Juneteenth, Spring Cleaning, Father's Day, and Find Your Voice. LA1 Larry Ferguson created a very tasteful Pride Month display with books, audios, and videos.

At the end of June, Bina Williams attended the American Library Association Conference in Chicago to celebrate the 2023 Randolph Caldecott Awards.
