BRIDGEPORT LIBRARY

- July was a busy month at Beardsley; we had over 4,000 visitors coming in to cool off on hot days.
 And also, over 1,800 items circulated that month the highest circulating items were, as always, children's picture books.
- PROGRAMMING: In July, we offered a great variety of library programs and events such as our
 weekly Chess Club for Kids, which has doubled in attendance over the summer. The majority of
 children who attend are between ages 5-12. Besides pairing players for chess matches and giving
 lessons to beginners, our library staff Phil and Elvis, who lead the class, also use the large size PC
 monitor to introduce children to various chess strategies at the beginning of each session. A the end
 of the class children are highly encouraged to check out nonfiction books on Chess.
- PROGRAMMING: We held 5 computer classes with total of 57 attendees. The topics were: Google Sheets; Google Slides; MS Excel; All About Emails; and Intro to Typing.
- PROGRAMMING: On July 24th, the Discovery Museum conducted "Be a Space Engineer" workshop for students in grades: 2-7. Students could participate in creating a simple rocket models, spacesuit designs, and other space engineer related activities.
- St. Paul's Daycare visited the library on July 8th for a guided class visit with librarian. Besides storytime and an introduction to library resources, the students were able to watch a Booflix story on the large screen.
- Thanks to Brian and Peter, we got our fourth public computer station installed in the Community Room, which is used during computer classes and other programs.
- COLLECTION: We received hundreds of new materials in July. Patrons are excited borrowing new
 titles; besides picture books, adult nonfiction has been gaining in popularity among our patrons as
 well.
- BOOK DISPLAYS IN JULY: Celebrating 4th of July; Summer Reading 2024.
- OUTREACH: On July 15th and 30th, Phil and Anna visited the Bullard-Havens High School and were able to register many teens for library cards. The teachers were excited about cards too.
- OUTREACH: Andre and Phil taught a PC class at the Eisenhower Senior Center on 7/23/24.
- OUTREACH: Andre participated on the first day of the Farmer's Market in downtown on July 11;th Elvis represented the library in the Puerto Rican Parade on July 14th.
- SUCCESSES: After various security guard changes in the past year, Gabriel Rodriquez has become
 our permanent guard.
- CONCERNS: After school outreach at Bullard-Havens High School, we've discovered that teachers' library cards (offered to out of town teachers, who teach in Bridgeport) don't have an access to electronic resources. We've addressed that issue to the circulation committee and hoping that this would change soon, so teachers will be able to use electronic resources with their library cards.
