Staff are still struggling to adjust to changes implemented since Margaret and Mat have come to Black Rock. We continue to deal with frankly bizarre issues such as: refusal to put away personal devices, reluctance to do work unsuited for the desk downstairs in the office, staff eating in public areas, etc. Staff are overall unreceptive to feedback, and take it very personally instead of constructively (for example, feedback on flyers that need significant revision created noticeable tension for staff). Staff also seem reluctant to bring their concerns forward, making modifications, or even conversation about issues extremely difficult to pursue.
