Highlights

Collections

Weeding/Ordering continues. We did manage to decrease our overall collection size by about 11% last year, so the goal now is to decrease another 14%. Library IQ software will allow us to deep dive better into our collections to really curate orders and weeds based on what subjects move and those that don't.

Our Wonder books are circulating, but our Habbi Habbi's are not. I think the issue is the extra step of getting the wand separately from the books. I don't have a solution (yet) but have been pondering other ways to market or package the books for easier use.

We have seen an overall increase in circulation throughout our collections over the year. With a little more weeding, and strategic partnering, I think we can expect a decent increase again this year in circulation.

Programs

July was a little quieter than expected, even with in-house programs. Between the heat and the fact that several staff came down ill for a week at a time we had to operate under less-than-ideal conditions. However, our story times are increasing in attendees and in attendee consistency, and we are starting to get a small but regular attendance at our teen programs. We actually have seen a sudden increase in teens using the library in general, and I do expect these users to form the backbone of our teen crafts and activities this fall.

Outreach and Networking:

We have started attending the Black Rock Farmer's Market in July. While we see a lot of familiar faces there, and many people already have their cards (or are from out of town), it has been good for the neighborhood to see us participating in the community. Since attending, we have seen some of the same locals start to come in to check us out, and the connections we are already making with local vendors has been useful.

Concerns:

- I have some concerns about the building; we are starting to see water again in the building during heavy rains (primarily the boiler room, but then it leaks into the program room).
- I also think we need to get one more dehumidifier and additional air filter(s). When it rains, the smell of mold is strong. Our staff also seems to take ill frequently, and I worry that it is partly caused by an unhealthy building.
- I'd like to see our facade repair get underway, and I'd like to get started on the painting of our main level. There is apparent water damage on our main floor walls that needs to be addressed as well. Once the painting is done we can start to address the floor.

Patron-wise we do have a local person using the building who remains under watch by the staff. He has exhibited a tendency to hover near young people and in their spaces unless addressed by staff. He has yet to do something that truly violates our policies, but his behavior is curious enough to have the entire team on alert when he is here.
