As always, patrons told us they wanted to come, but there were other commitments, the weather was bad and, of course, everyone's favorite: parking is tough. Michele has been researching how other libraries with no parking handle the issue; so far—no solutions. Staff and Patron brainstorming have led to thoughts on collaborating with the Burroughs Community Center, allowing library patrons to park their cars at the Center and walk to the Library.
