### Librarian Jeffrey Coutts:

- Administered the virtual program: H.P. Lovecraft and Cosmic Horror with literary critic, S.T. Joshi on November 14th. It was well attended; we had 30 people.

- Held a programming meeting on November 8<sup>th</sup> wherein we discussed the programming budget, future programs for Black History Month and Women's History Month and collaboration between the History Center and Adult Services on programs.
- Attended an information session related to the Library's database Freegal; it was informative showing the features it has and how to promote them to the public.
- Continued to learn about 3D printing and created several bookends to be used in the library. Also created an H.P. Lovecraft bookmark for the aforementioned H.P. Lovecraft program to raffle off to an attendee.
- Went to the CLC Vendor Expo at SCSU. I learned about different databases that could be integrated into our collection including Hive Class which has a large library of video tutorials for physical activity such as basketball, yoga, etc. I also learned about Today's Business Solutions which offers printing services that rivals the Library's current printing services. They offer mobile printing, printing kiosks, scanning and faxing.

### Programming Milestones

- Memoir Writing Workshop, Saturday, November 16. 5 attended, 3 live and 2 remotely via Zoom.
- BHC hosted an English Class of 8 students and a professor from the University of Bridgeport. The Professor was instructing the class in how to use primary sources for research and writing.
- Francisco Gabriel Lopez Fuentes, archaeologist, conducted the BHC's first, planned fully bilingual program with Abraham Lima as translator and assistant. The topic was sites of archaeological interest in Bridgeport that can be reached on foot. Lopez Fuentes presented chapters from his recently published book on the same topic.

Staff Development	No new items for this month. Staff continue to coordinate activities and programs with staff from RandR and Youth Services

### Highlights

- Requests submitted by email and phone continue unabated.
- BHC continues to receive positive responses to Pettit's new exhibit on Jasper McLevy, Bridgeport Mayor from 1933-1957.
- Items from the General Oral History Collection were finally placed online. More materials will be available by the end of January. Volunteers have been conducting oral history interviews on behalf of the BHC. These new interviews will be added to the BHC General Oral History collection for its ongoing program. All interviews will eventually be placed on the CTDA and the BHC website.
- Van Tuyl and Pettit continue to devote time monthly to the MTMS project. In November, staff contacted leaders of various community organizations to invite them to the pre-launch meeting. On December 3<sup>rd</sup>, the MTMS team + the BHC staff will hold a meeting to instruct BPL staff on the program and how the public can contribute to it. The History Center was selected as a participant in the "My Town, My Story" project. The project is a joint effort between the CTDA and CT Humanities. The BHC is working with doctoral candidate Kenia Rodriguez and the CTDA staff to find innovative ways to collect materials from community groups and individuals for preservation and presentation.
- Pettit and Van Tuyl together with the assistance of Librarian Vivian Bordeaux have made progress with their inventorying and removal or cataloging of books on the 7th floor. Many items have been either deaccessioned, added to the collection, or have replaced current identical publications in poor condition.
- BHC has coordinated with the other teams on the Reference and Research Team and has
  planned several programs for the Fall/Winter season. Micro departments are sharing financial
  resources.
- Continued corrections/additions to current online sources such as finding aids and collection guides. This is a work-intensive project and takes time. CTDA has eliminated finding aids on its site, therefore the BHC archivists will have to update finding aid records on the CAO and BHC websites. Discoverability of BHC collections is the ultimate goal.
- Continued cataloging work in BHC's collections management software.
- Management and planning for the BHC's storage area continued. There is an ongoing need
  to buy and implement supplemental shelving as a work around to inadequate storage in the
  stacks and cages, but there are limitations.
- Continued selected deaccession activities.

### Outreach:

- Wednesday, November 6th, we hosted two 3rd grade classes (24 students, 3 teachers/chaperones) from Adam J Lewis Academy. Children were introduced to the Children's Department & our programs; a demonstration of our digital resources, Habbi Habbi kits, Launchpads, & Wonderbooks; and shown a variety of popular titles, both new and classics. Additionally, since the class is studying Ancient Egypt, they were presented with a curated selection of our books on Egypt.
- Wednesday, November 20th, Taslima and Ana visited the three kindergarten classes (75 children, 6 teachers/aides) at Columbus School. They gave the students library cards (applications were sent to parents and returned to the school), event calendars, bookmarks, and read them several books, including bilingual books for the primarily Spanish class.
