Highlights: October was filled with many celebrations! The entrance of Fall, Banned Book Week, Hispanic Heritage Month, Halloween, just to name a few!

Newfield partnered with Bridgeport Health Dept. and Social Services for a special bilingual story hour reading of "Germs Are Not for Sharing". Health resources and giveaways were shared with families.

Three groups of students from CHS Transitioning Academy visited during the month. Library cards were issued to students. There is an increased usage of the teen space for homework and reading. There is an increase in teen participation in programing. The teen Spooktacular Paint Pour event attracted 13 teens, a jump from the usual 1-3 attendees.
