Projects continued and new ones began in January. The Covid testing behind the building ceased, although the Library was not notified. We tracked down the information fairly quickly, pulled our flyers and info, and reminded the City to update their webpage, as several disappointed patrons came into the branch looking for explanations. We still have a few at-home test kits for patrons. The FDA again extended the expiration dates, so our original expiration dates now extend to April. Displays included Martin Luther King Jr Day and Hello Winter (although some might argue they'd prefer a goodbye to the bitterly cold temperatures...).

From Bina: The month of January found more people coming into the Children's Room and to our programs. Team STEAM had its last 5 sessions led by Central High Senior Iris Rivera. The three boys who came throughout were lively but enjoyed it. Other children came and went during the nine weeks. LITT Chess picked up quite a bit after a fall slump. New coaches include another CHS senior and a Fairfield U. student. We had to recall some of the chess sets purchased with my grant money from the branches due to high turnout the first session of the new year. The highlight of January for me was the culmination of my "Caldecott Year." On two Saturdays and one Sunday, I attended 8 hour zooms to discuss the nominations our committee of 15 had made during the fall. While the 8 hours seemed daunting beforehand, they were a lot of fun and were timed well in terms of breaks. The last weekend of January, I attended LibLearnX (formerly ALA Midwinter) where the committee met in person to decide who would win the Caldecott and honors. The next evening, we called all our artists to give them the good news. After one wrong number, and a call back from Belize where one was vacationing, we just had to wait until the next morning's announcements to spill the news. Hot Dog was our winner with four honor books!

From Monika: We started a new monthly program, Quilting. The first workshop went very well. Vision Boards with Veronica Arias and New Year Resolutions with Nicoletta Vogele got a nice number of people. Yoga on Saturday mornings is very popular. Our regular programs like Lawyers in libraries, Mindfulness & Vaccine clinics are going on. I had 14 digital navigator appointments; many patrons are coming back with different questions. We still give out the tablets and Hot-spots. January has been very busy scheduling tax appointments.

Tax Assistance starts in February. That is always a very busy time for us. We are also looking forward to some great programs for Take Your Child to the Library Day, Valentine's Day and Black History Month.
