YOUTH SERVICES

In the month of June, four Wednesday evening story time programs with themes such as Summer and Juneteenth and five Tuesday mornings Little Learners story times were held. Plans are being completed on the Seaside Park Storytime program which will be held every Tuesday morning in July and August.

On June 23rd, to celebrate Pride Month, on the library's kids Facebook page, a live streamed program hosted by Summer Orlando, a drag queen was held.

The summer reading program started on June 28. Sign-up sheets, reading logs, prizes, staff instructions, have been set up. Patrons have started registering for the programs; all programs are being advertised on the library's website and social media.

The inventory of the Young Adult collection has been completed; parts of the juvenile collections has been weeded and replacements order.

CUSTOMER SERVICES

The staff continues to receive items for Burroughs and Newfield. Alexis is being trained to receive and process Newfield materials.

The number of items being borrowed by patrons are still low but in time we hope the numbers will increase. The number of deliverIT incoming bins this month was 22 the number of outgoing was 20; Yankee Courier incoming bins were 14 and outgoing was 34.

The number of library card registrations total 81 (6 were Computer Use only cards)

The numbers for Quick Pick Up and online card registration are near zero, patron prefer to come into the library to pick up their library cards and to borrow items.

Adult Programming Report – Burroughs Saden Library
June 2021

With the ongoing pandemic situation, programming at the library is currently only of a virtual nature.

Two Adult Programs were held in the month of June.

On June 10th, GraceElaine Osborne presented a program on Sound Baths. A therapist from Brooklyn, NY, Ms. Osborne offered an unusual program with very little introduction to her practice. She told us that once the program began it would be self-explanatory. She suggested that those in attendance turn off their cameras and sit or lay back in a relaxed position. Thus, began nearly 45 minutes of relaxing quiet and various sounds. Vibrations, bells, sound bowls and even a period of flute music put us into a bit of a trancelike state. I could feel myself relaxing and thinking freely as the program continued. Somewhat like a massage, we were able to drift off and free our minds through this interesting presentation. We had 17 participants and a lively discussion once Ms. Osborne was finished. I can see this as an additive to a yoga program or mindfulness series.

On June 24th, Medium Sidney Sherman presented a double program on Auras and another entitled We Are Not Alone. Ms. Sherman invited a number of her friends and avid followers to the program. As somewhat of a testimony, Ms. Sherman shared that even as a young child, she was able to see past dead relatives that no one else could see. They gave her messages and guidance. She said that once people become attuned to the signals, they would be more aware of visitors from beyond the grave.

The second part of her program dealt with body energy or auras. The moon's gravitational pull is strongest when the moon is full and this program was held on the evening of a full moon. Actually, it was a rare occurrence known as the Strawberry Moon when the full moon appears on the Summer Solstice. Ms. Sherman talked about different colored auras that appear around people and how they indicated different temperaments and mood styles. This lively discussion involved 24 people, a good attendance for a Thursday evening.

June 2021 Narrative Monthly Report for North Branch

There wasn't any idleness at North Branch in June, but there is an opportunity coming up for patrons to enjoy Forest Bathing outside this summer with Monika Anton. June was spent putting the finishing touches on this and other upcoming summer programs for adults, teens and kids while maintaining the usual favorites such as Mindfulness and Valic Finance, Zoomin' Little Bears, and more. Displays included Juneteenth and other June related materials.

On planning children's programs and reading initiatives for summer, Bina Williams noted: "Prepping for summer reading... keeps us busy in June: Planning programs and displays, copying reading lists from other schools to check ownership, and just psyching ourselves for the influx of young readers. Exciting STEAM programs started this month thanks to the generosity of the Westport Library. We applied for and received a grant from the Mayor's Youth Summer Reading Initiative for people ages 14-24. Our program is We Dig Chess, a continuation of our partnerships with DIGUSA. From early July to late September, two groups divided by age will have chess classes and scrimmages online." Bina also tried to virtually attend ALA's annual meeting, but a busy department and lack of adequate staff made it very difficult. We continue to be dramatically short-staffed 3 full-timers and 2 part-timers. The staff has been stretching to make it all work. As we get busier, we look forward to replacements soon.

Library Assistant II Sarah Greenberg noted that several patrons from our dark days of COVID closures had not picked up cards they signed up for on our website. Summer is a great time to encourage them to visit the library in person, pick up their cards, and see what great things we have to offer. She emailed each one. Several have been in already.

Library life in a park is usually as idyllic as it sounds, but we did have to remind the lacrosse players that library walls are not backboards for drilling in skills practice. We turned a potential patron away when a joyfully AWOL Alaskan Huskie came in, visited with patrons, and finally followed Paula out the automatic doors, which we turned off briefly so he could not return until his weary and apologetic owners could convince him they were not playing a game. Other building issues included the irregular start of security services, a fire marshal inspection, and the horror of AC issues. Thanks to David O for putting up with a cranky building and staff.

Library use, circulation and visitors increased but some patrons question the city's visitor sign in and mask requirements (especially on hot days). Most understand and cooperate.

We lost loyal patron Barbara M. recently. Her daughter brought in the bookmarks Barbara loved to craft, so they could be shared with patrons. We were honored to share her gift.
